

Creative Therapies with Children: Neurodiversity and Trauma through the lens of Polyvagal Theory Workshop

Neurodivergent children experience the world through different sensory and regulatory pathways, yet traditional therapeutic approaches often rely heavily on verbal processing and behavioural compliance. Polyvagal Theory offers a fundamental understanding of how all humans connect and relate—revealing how every nervous system moves through states of safety, activation, and shutdown regardless of neurotype. This understanding becomes the foundation for all therapeutic work. By developing their own nervous system literacy first, practitioners can meet neurodivergent clients' nervous system to nervous system, recognising that healing and relationship occurs through co-regulation rather than cognitive insight alone. This bottom-up, body-centred approach honours neurodivergent children's innate communication styles through creative and non-speaking modalities like play, art, movement, and symbolic communication—building capacity for regulation and relational connection in ways that respect how their nervous systems naturally engage with the world. This is particularly significant for neurodivergent children who have experienced trauma, as it creates safety through attuned presence rather than demanding adaptation to neurotypical therapeutic norms.
